

EVERYDAY HEROES

HEALING WOUNDS and Mending Hearts



Helen Rinne, a registered nurse, helps restore hope for patients who enter SVdP's Virginia G. Piper Medical and Dental Clinic.

"The patients that we see, often times, don't have any other options. These people are feeling really hopeless about their situations. They think 'This is never going to heal, I'm not going to get better,'" said Helen.

Helen volunteers two to three days of the week at SVdP. While she helps with all aspects of the clinic, she focuses most of her time in the wound care program, caring for uninsured patients who are discharged from the hospital with large open wounds.

"You're afraid when you're sick even when things are going well in your life. It's a scary thing to be in the hospital, then add to that a situation where there's no insurance and there are no alternatives. The patients are at the end of their rope and they're afraid," Helen said.

Untreated open wounds can cause infections and other serious medical conditions. On top of being in pain, many patients are unable to work or even lose their jobs. These patients come to SVdP, where they receive various treatments that they would not be able to manage at home without insurance. Patients are overcome with relief after seeing what Helen and the clinic can do for them

"You just feel like you make a difference and you can see it everyday. Patients here are so grateful for the care that they get," said Helen. "They begin to feel better and they're so appreciative. Hearing that feedback, that you're making a difference, is really rewarding."

Deals Abound at Flagstaff Thrift Store, BUT FRIENDSHIPS ARE FREE

Margaret Ann Hughes and Nancy

in Flagstaff. With 18 locations throughout
Arizona, SVdP thrift stores are known to
have the best deals for clothing, furniture
and household items. And according
to these ladies, the Flagstaff location is
especially known to locals as a place people
can come for much needed companionship.

While Margaret Ann and Nancy work on everything from pricing, cleaning, and setting up floral displays in the thrift store, their main focus is on the customers.

"We're concerned about making the customers feel very welcomed. It's a place where people gather. We have a lot of folks who just come in because they need to have friends around and they like the environment," Margaret Ann said.

Nancy, who generally works the front of the store, knows almost everyone by name, said Margaret Ann. She knows their circumstances, too. "I really love the people here and I love all the volunteers that we get to hang out with everyday. I mean it's so much fun to come in here. The days are just wonderful and it's very rewarding to be with everybody and to follow the mission that we have," Nancy said.

Nancy and Margaret wish that more people would volunteer to see how rewarding it is.

"I know the community here really appreciates coming in and just feeling welcomed here. You just have so much self-satisfaction because you know that what we're doing is helping all those who are really in need in this community," Margaret said.

SERVING AT SVDP

Christmas 'Matchmakers'
Link Up Donors with Families
IN NEED

or struggling families, putting dinner on the table is stressful on a regular basis. After paying for rent and utilities, there is often little left to pay for other bills and buy groceries. Around Christmas time, these families have the added worry of providing a special Christmas for their children.

That's why for the last five years, Dottie Sullivan has been coordinating SVdP's Adopt-a-Family program. The program allows individuals and families to "adopt" families in need by providing Christmas gifts and meals. It's a program that has become a Christmas tradition for hundreds of families in Arizona and many times lifelong friendships are formed through the process.

Families who need help are first connected through their local SVdP food pantry, also called conferences. The conference volunteers, called Vincentians, visit the families to bring them emergency food boxes and also to gather information for the Adopt-a-Family program. The age

and needs of each family member are recorded so that adopters know what types of gifts to get.

All of these family profiles then go to Dottie, who matches them up with adopters. "There are a lot factors to consider, like location, ages of kids and the size of the family. My goal every year is to make sure that families are matched up appropriately so that it's a good experience for everyone," Dottie said.

Last year, three new volunteers helped Dottie with the intake process. Lauri Curran, Marti Engebretsen and Lola Espriella worked tirelessly for two weeks before Christmas to take calls from families wishing to adopt.

"Sometimes people want to adopt families with kids who are similar in age to their own so that their kids can help pick out the presents," said Lauri. "I think it's great that families want to do this together."

Thanks to their efforts, more than 800 families were adopted last year. Many of the families adopted were working single mothers who just don't make enough to make ends meet, let alone have enough to buy Christmas presents for their children.

"The real heavy lifters are the Vincentians and families adopting," Dottie said. "We were just behind the scenes getting them connected to make Christmas happen for everyone."

'St. Vincent de Paul Saved Our Lives': **Program Helps Families** Get Back Home

regory and Delaha were so excited to move to Phoenix with their 3-year-old son Marcus. They lived in a rough neighborhood in Toledo, Ohio and had been hoping for years to move to a better place. Gregory was the maintenance manager of their apartment complex and struggled to find another job that would pay enough for them to move out.

"I wanted a better environment for my family," said Gregory. "I wanted to change our lives." That's why they jumped on the opportunity to move to Phoenix when Gregory's brother offered him a job at the construction company where he managed a team of workers. While space was tight, Gregory's brother also let them stay with him until they would be ready for a place of their own.

It all seemed like a good plan. However, a few weeks after Gregory moved his family out to Phoenix, his brother was unexpectedly laid off from his job. "I was devastated," said Delaha. "I cried every night."

Without any prospects for other jobs, Gregory called his former employer in Toledo and was offered his old job back. However, they used their last savings to move to Phoenix and had no way to get back.

They came to St. Vincent de Paul and were approved for travel assistance the same day. "We had no way to get home and nowhere else to go. We would've become homeless without St. Vincent de Paul," Gregory said.

Using gift cards provided by **U.S. Airways**, volunteers helped Gregory and Delaha make travel arrangements to get home to Toledo.

"St. Vincent de Paul saved our lives," said Gregory. "Our family couldn't help us. St. Vincent de Paul was our family when we had nobody left. I hope that one day I'll have the chance to give back and help other people like us."



Featured Auction Item: Fine Art by SVdP Kids



DENTAL CLINIC Garners Support

Thanks to generous funders who recognize the great need for dental care in our community, we received several grants over the last few months!





Medical and Dental Clinic Moves to Electronic Health RECORDS



ith nearly 15,000 appointments to juggle every year, our medical and dental clinic received a much needed grant from Blue Cross Blue Shield that will help us convert to an electronic health record system.

Transitioning to an electronic health record, while not an easy task, has many benefits. One of the greatest is the ability to better manage prescriptions. Handwritten prescriptions are fraught with issues that consume a great deal of staff time to remedy and cause frustration for patients. The electronic health record can send a prescription directly to the pharmacy or print out a clearly written and complete prescription. It will also track medications in the patient's electronic medical record and alert the physician to drug interactions and dosing issues.

The clinic also has many activities going on through the week and not all are on-site. The patient electronic medical record will be available to clinic staff through a secure online system that can be accessed anywhere and anytime. Eventually, there will be the ability to exchange information with other healthcare facilities for better coordination of patient care. Electronic health records also have built-in designs to help track patient information, cue reminders and alert us of potential problems.

Thanks to Blue Cross Blue Shield, the new system will help us maximize our time and resources, making every donated dollar stretch further and every volunteer hour more efficient than ever.

Helps Ozanam Manor Resident

Walk Again



Brad continues to look for work so that he can move out of Ozanam Manor and into his own home again. In the meantime, he has become an advocate for SVdP.

Prad has worked hard all of his life. He doesn't know any other way. However, he lost his job and became homeless about two years ago. He had just left the hospital, after having the toes on this right foot amputated due to diabetes.

With nowhere to go, Brad used his savings to rent a taxi cab. He drove clients during the day and slept in the taxi at night. On good days, when we had extra business, he paid for a night in a motel so that he could shower and sleep in a bed. "All I did was drive and save the money I earned, because I didn't know if I'd have business the next day," Brad said.

"I thought that if I kept looking, I would eventually find a better job," said Brad. "I wasn't ready to give up yet." Brad decided to continue living out of his taxi, but the lifestyle was difficult and eventually took a toll on his health. He developed a diabetic ulcer on the bottom of his right foot, prohibiting him from driving. Eventually he ended up back in the hospital and had his foot amputated on his 50th birthday.

Brad returned his taxi and with no income, he moved in to Ozanam Manor. Since he was 50 years old, he was qualified to stay at Ozanam Manor and choose to apply for disability benefits or continue looking for employment.

"When I first moved in, I was amazed at everything. I couldn't believe that I had the freedom to come and go as I pleased and that, if I wanted to get up in the middle of the night to have cereal in the kitchen, I was allowed to do that." Brad said.

Once Brad's wound had healed, he was fitted with a prosthetic foot, with the help of SVdP's medical clinic and the Our Lady of Joy Conference, which paid for the cost. "With the prosthesis, Brad will be able to do all that he used to do before the amputation," said Allen Dolberry, founder of Hands and Feet of Jesus, a foundation that lowered the cost of Brad's prosthesis from \$8,000 to \$600.

Brad continues to look for work so that he can move out of Ozanam Manor and into his own home again. In the meantime, he has become an advocate for SVdP. "I tell everyone about St. Vincent de Paul," said Brad. "I tell them to go online and donate because I don't know what would've happened to me if it wasn't for them."







Building a Dream PLAYGROUND

Conveniently located across from our family dining room, families can exercise and play before coming inside for dinner and other activities.


The playground was a true community effort. In addition to Kaboom! and Humana, several local companies pitched in:
