Since the beginning of time rituals, ceremonies, and celebrations, have been an integral part of the human experience. Rituals give us a sense of direction and connect us to God as well as to our brothers and sisters. They give us a sense of belonging and create unity. The words and actions involved in these activities convey the value and even the sacredness of the things that are being commemorated or celebrated. Rituals allow us to express and affirm our beliefs and enable individuals and groups to pass on wisdom, experience, and commitment.

Webster's Dictionary defines a member as someone who belongs to a group and who agrees to meet regularly with them and to work with the other members. Membership in the Society is a sign of solidarity and like-mindedness. It requires accountability and the obligation to participate in training and formation activities along with a commitment to grow in holiness through service to the poor.

The commissioning of new members is a monumental part of joining the Society. By a majority vote of the conference, a new member is formally chosen by the conference and, by virtue of the commissioning ceremony, they are entrusted with the mission of the Society and given the authority to serve the poor with and through the Vincentian family. During this ritual, they commit to the conference and the Society and the conference and Society commit to them. In other words, they become an official member of our family.

The commissioning of new Vincentians is the sacred responsibility of every conference. This ritual helps to mark the beginning of a new members' formal Vincentian journey. This day is so significant that the Church offers every new member the opportunity to by virtue of their commissioning receive a plenary indulgence.

Being an active (full enhanced) member of the Society of St. Vincent de Paul is not for everyone, nor is it just for anyone. Being a Vincentian comes from a special calling from God. Members of the Society are more than volunteers because being a Vincentian is not what we do; it is who we are. In every sense of the word, being a Vincentian is a vocation and, as such, that vocation deserves to be celebrated and acknowledged in a sacred and formal manner. Every new member is entitled to a commissioning ceremony and we, as Vincentians, must never overlook the value of that ritual.

Prior to receiving the invite to “Oz”, he was living in his car struggling with many personal health issues. Michael was the caretaker for his elderly parents, and became homeless after they passed away. Michael’s first day at Ozanam Manor was October 24, 2021. He came to Oz

with a very positive outlook on his current situation and was able to build connections with other residents as well as his case manager and staff during his time here. He spent his time volunteering and helped run the front desk. Michael officially moved out of Oz on July 14, 2022. We were able to provide him with all of the furniture and appliances for his new apartment located in Downtown Phoenix. We are so grateful for all of the donations that help make it possible for us to move our residents back to independent living. As Michael is settling in, we are already looking forward to home visits with him. Michael wanted to give a huge thank you to everyone who has made this possible for him. He said that he is going to miss the amazing staff as well as all of the friends he made during his time at OZ.

41st ANNUAL CONFERENCE FOOD DRIVE

Each year for the past 41 years the **Men of Our Lady of Perpetual Help (OLPH)** and the **OLPH SVdP Scottsdale Conference** have facilitated the Society of St. Vincent de Paul Food Drive materials. These Food Drive materials are distributed for Conference pantries. Over the years the food drive has grown to include some 70 or more SVdP Conferences.

At the **Saturday, September 17th General Membership Meeting** at 420 W. Watkins St. in Phoenix, we will have Food Drive supplies for all who have ordered them. Please check with **your Pastor** for his permission to conduct a food drive.

After the September 17th meeting Conferences and churches may pick up the **free supplies** which they have ordered for conducting their local food drives. The MEN OF OUR LADY of PERPETUAL HELP (Scottsdale) will be available to assist. These include **grocery bags, holy cards, envelopes, and flyers** suggesting appropriate types of food for donation by parishioners. Typically, these materials will be stapled together, distributed to parishioners one weekend, and returned with donations the following weekend.

This annual food drive allows parishioners to donate over **30,000 bags of food for our SVdP food pantries** each year. In addition, donations are made that provide for food to be purchased. **The total value to conference pantries is well in excess of \$1 million each year.** Please conduct a food drive for your own local use, or plan to donate your excess food to be picked up by another SVdP conference of your choice.





From the Desk of the Conference Resources Committee

Frequency of Conference Meetings:

According to the Rule of the Society Part III Statute 5, "Members of the Society traditionally gather in communities called "Conferences" which meet weekly or at least twice a month. This is to affirm the importance of the spiritual and social dimensions of Vincentians coming together as a community of faith and love, prayer and action."

The Rule requires conferences to meet at least twice a month. A gathering of people working in a pantry or ministry on a given day may be helpful in organizing the work to be done but that gathering must never be counted as a conference meeting. Conference meetings must be set as regularly scheduled gatherings with a complete agenda that includes prayer and a spiritual reflection along with reports and business items.

The conference is the base unit of the Society and its commitment to gathering its members for spirituality and fellowship must never give way to our works. The works of the Society flow from our spirituality and our fellowship and, if those two elements are short changed, we run the danger of being just another charitable group. Our primary goal is for our members to grow in holiness through service. St. Vincent de Paul often shared this quote, "God wants first the heart and then the work." The heart of the Society resides in its conference meetings and they must always be at the center of who we are and what we do.

Retention Policy:

In this age of computers and electronic records, conference must still keep a hard copy of certain records and documents. While electronic files are useful, the format they are saved in can quickly become absolute and thus the conference may be unable to open, view or print the information in the file if and when it is needed. Information that needs to be retained for more than three years, can be kept electronically but a hard copy should also be placed safely in a secured place where officers can easily access and retrieve it.

SVdP Thrift Stores

A recent article in the E-Gazette, our National Council's Newsletter, addressed the issue of the messages we as Vincentians often convey through our signage, written materials, and discussions concerning our thrift stores and our other programs. The article talked about signage in a particular SVdP thrift store targeted at helping donors and shoppers understand that our stores are an important link in the movement to save our environment through reusing and recycling unwanted clothing and household items. Although the information was true and valuable, it

did little to share with others who we are as a Society and what our stores do for the community and the poor. The signage in our newest store located at Greenway and Tatum in Scottsdale is aimed specificical to tell our story, but that signage is not enough. We need Vincentians to carry that message out to their family, friends ,and fellow parishioners.

Our stores are a place where items can be reused or recycled but they are so much more. Our stores are a place of community and support. The poor receive items from our stores free through the conference voucher and Care Card programs. Additionally, we have a program where families who are getting a home or apartment after being displaced or homeless can receive an entire house full of furniture, bedding, and kitchen supplies at no charge. Our stores are often the first point of contact that donors, shoppers, and the poor have with our Society. The volunteers and staff routinely listen to their stories and make referrals or offer helpful suggestions as needed.

Several years ago, I received a call from a thrift store manager asking if my conference could help a family that was in his store to buy a used refrigerator. The manager overheard the father explaining to his children that yes, they needed the larger refrigerator but could only afford the smaller one and they did not have time to wait and save more money. He asked if our conference could join his store in making up the difference so that the family could have the refrigerator they desperately needed. And it goes without saying, that his store and my conference joyfully provided the family with the larger unit. When he told the family that they could have the larger refrigerator at no additional cost, they could not believe that any store could be so kind.

Yes, our stores help our community reuse and recycle unwanted items but we are primarily in the business of offering and restoring hope. Each and every day our stores provide needed items as well as large servings of kindness, compassion, and joy to those who enter through their doors. You can spread the good news about our stores by sharing with others who we are as a Society and how our stores fit into the beautiful tapestry of our mission and our works.

A gift through the Vincentian Annuity will give you the security of a fixed income over your lifetime and provide support for St. Vincent de Paul that will last forever.

As an example, Helen, an 80-year-old widow and St. Vincent de Paul volunteer, recently established a \$50,000 Vincentian gift annuity. For her age, the annuity rate is 6.8%, meaning she'll receive \$3,400 annually for the rest of her life. And, she may take an income tax deduction of about 50% of her gift this year. Best of all, her gift will support St. Vincent de Paul's work for generations to come. Annuity gifts start at \$10,000.
