#### ONE HEART AND ONE MIND



For freedom Christ set us free... For you were called for freedom, brothers. But do not use this freedom as an opportunity for the flesh; rather, serve one another through love.

For the whole law is fulfilled in one statement, namely, "You shall love your neighbor as yourself." (Gal 5:1, 13-14)

As the month of July dawns, Americans join together to commemorate our nation's fight to secure the freedoms and liberties we now enjoy. But even amid the cookouts and fireworks, there is a deep understanding that our

freedom came at a high cost. Thousands of revolutionary soldiers and supporters purchased our freedom with their very lives. Yet, even as great as their sacrifices were, the freedoms they won pale in comparison to the freedom over sin and death that was purchased by Jesus on our behalf at Calvary.

As Vincentians, we are called to reflect the love that exists between the Father, the Son and the Holy Spirit. St. Louise de Marillac often called others to the love that creates unity and dispels disharmony when she said, "following the example of the Blessed Trinity, we must have but one heart and act with one mind as do the three divine Persons."

As St. John Paul II wrote, "being is more important than having and doing." As Vincentians, our highest priority must always be that of being. Being in relationship with God and with one another. While the decisions we make are important, the respect and unity we share while arriving at those decisions is even more important. May each of us be inspired to strive to work towards the goal of having one heart and one mind so that we may more closely reflect the example of perfect love and harmony from which we came to be. May our kindness and unity be a living sign of God's love and presence in the world and may we be good stewards of the freedoms we have been given.

## **QCD**Qualified Charitable Distributions

In recent years, my wife and I have been able to be more generous in our contributions to the Society, particularly the Endowment and other charities by taking advantage of Federal Tax law. We have accumulated retirement savings in tax deferred IRA's. By law, when you reach the age of 70 ½ (for us now 72 ½, I believe), you are required to withdraw a minimum amount (RMD) calculated off your balance at the end of the prior year and your life expectancy. This amount is taxable income at your full rate.

However, the law allows you to make donations to recognized charities directly from the tax-deferred account, known as QCD (qualified charity distributions). These distributions are considered part of your RMD obligation BUT your taxable income is reduced by every dollar you donate in this way.

This affects your overall tax liability and may even reduce your Medicare premiums. So, if you have tax deferred accounts, talk to your tax advisor about how you can benefit from giving to your favorite charities by QCD. Hopefully, like us, it will save you enough to be more generous in supporting our beloved Society. We particularly like to support the Endowment that will continue to directly help the conferences after we have gone to our eternal reward.

### 41st ANNUAL CONFERENCE FOOD DRIVE

Each year for the past 41 years the **Men of Our Lady of Perpetual Help (OLPH) and the OLPH SVdP Scottsdale Conference** have facilitated the Society of St. Vincent de Paul Food Drive materials. These Food Drive materials are distributed for Conference pantries. Over the years the food drive has grown to include some 70 or more SVdP Conferences.

At the **Saturday, September 17<sup>th</sup> General Membership Meeting** at 420 W. Watkins St. in Phoenix, we will have Food Drive supplies for all who have ordered them. <u>Please check with your Pastor for his permission to conduct a food drive</u>.

After the September 17<sup>th</sup> meeting Conferences and churches may pick up the **free supplies** which they have ordered for conducting their local food drives. The MEN OF OUR LADY of PERPETUAL HELP (Scottsdale) will be available to assist. These include **grocery bags**, **holy cards**, **envelopes**, **and flyers** suggesting appropriate types of food for donation by parishioners. Typically, these materials will be stapled together, distributed to parishioners one weekend, and returned with donations the following weekend.

**Lucy Meraz (602-850-6761)** will be sending out further information in early August asking Conference Presidents to sign up. If you have any questions, you can contact either Lucy at the above number or **Dan Troop at 602-510-5469**.

This annual food drive allows parishioners to donate over **30,000 bags of food for our SVdP food pantries** each year. In addition, donations are made that provide for food to be purchased. **The total value to conference pantries is well in excess of \$1 million each year.** Please conduct a food drive for your own local use, or plan to donate your excess food to be picked up by another SVdP conference of your choice.





#### A NEW MEMBER ADMISSION PROCESS

In order to determine if God is calling them to become a Vincentian, a prospective new member, with the approval of the Conference, will be welcomed as a guest at a Conference meeting.

<u>Important Note</u>: All volunteers and potential Active or Full Members of the Society must complete the Catholic Diocese of Phoenix Safe Environment Training before working or volunteering with a parish conference.

A prospective new member, due to their involvement in the Society's work, may be invited or may convey an interest in becoming a Vincentian as an **Associate Member**:

"Associate Members are those affiliated with the Society by formal action of the Conference or Council with which the member will be joined. Associate Members include those who sincerely and publicly accept the Society's Rule but may or may not belong to the Catholic Church and may or may not attend Conference meetings or engage in the works of the Society on a regular basis. Associate Members are kept informed of the developments and activities of their immediate groupings, as well as the general progress of the Society, particularly in the local area or diocese. They are invited to attend the general meetings and special observances of the Society and to participate in its charitable activities." (Rule: Part III-Statute 3)

It should be noted that for the Conferences associated with the SVdP Diocesan Council of Phoenix, non-Catholic Associate Members, who have completed the basic Ozanam Formation Experience (OFE) classes and who meet all other requirements for active membership may, by a Conference vote, be allowed to make motions, participate fully in Conference discussions, and vote in all Conference matters, but may not under any circumstances hold office. (See Article 7 of the Conference Bylaws.)

A prospective new member who may be invited or interested in becoming a Vincentian as an **Active Member** will be given a period of candidacy and discernment during which they will observe the Conference and participate in its activities:

"Active Members are those who participate regularly in the prayer life, meetings and charitable activities through personal contact with the poor of the Vincentian Conference. An Active Member accepts the Rule and Statutes of the Society, belongs to the Catholic Church and is received as a Vincentian brother or sister. Only Active Members hold office in the organization." (Rule: Part III-Statute 3)

#### A NEW MEMBER ADMISSION PROCESS

When a prospective new member requests to be welcomed into the Conference as a candidate for Active Membership, he/she begins an Admission Process.

- 1. The following is the Admission Process. The candidacy and discernment period will last approximately 6 to 8 weeks or more and will consist of the following:
- The Conference assures compliance with the Diocesan "Safe Environment" requirements by having the candidate complete the Safe Environment Training Foundation Course/Renewals and a background check. Candidates must be SET compliant before they are considered for membership.
- The candidate will complete the Formation Policy requirements as defined in the approved Formation Policy of the Society of St. Vincent de Paul Phoenix Diocesan Council. (Conference Bylaws, Article 7: All full-enhanced (active) members must complete the basic Ozanam Formation Experience (OFE) classes as defined by the Phoenix Diocesan Formation Policy.)
- In addition to the OFE requirements, the Conference members may read, reflect and share their lived experiences on each section of the SVdP Member Handbook with the candidate. If this process is added, each member must have a copy of the handbook.
- A Conference member will be assigned as a sponsor for the candidate. The sponsor will
  meet with the candidate to respond to questions and to describe the activities of the
  Conference.
- The candidate will be given the opportunity to make at least two Home Visits with different Conference members. The exception would be in a Conference with Special Works where the candidate will be given opportunities for person-to-person service with those who are poor.
- The Spiritual Advisor, Conference President, and/or designated Membership Coordinator will lead the candidate in prayerful discernment emphasizing the Society's primary purpose of growth in holiness and guiding them in Vincentian Spirituality.
- At the conclusion of the candidacy period, the candidate will have a meeting with the
  President to discuss the candidate's experiences in the Conference. The candidate
  discusses the activities and services that they feel called to do as part of their ministry.
  At this point, if the candidate has discerned that they have a calling to be a Vincentian
  (Vincentian Vocation), they may request to become an Active Member.
- 2. After the President, Spiritual Advisor and the candidate discern readiness for Active membership, the Conference takes formal action, normally by a resolution, to accept the candidate into Active membership. (Rule: Part III-Statute 3)
- 3. The candidate is then Commissioned as a new member of the Society and given the SVdP pin. This commissioning should take place at an appropriate time and occasion, normally at a Conference or Council liturgy or at a Festival Meeting. (Rule: Part III-Statute 4)

  The Commissioning Ceremony for a New Member is found in the Vincentian Celebrations book or online.

The new member will continue walking the Vincentian Pathway through reflection and sharing on the Serving in Hope Modules and the other resources offered by the National Office. The Council will offer opportunities for Vincentian Formation by sponsoring the Ozanam Formation Experience (OFE), retreats and various activities.

#### From the Desk of the Conference Resources Committee

#### The Conference Meeting:

The Conference Meeting is the foundation where all other activities of the Society are developed. It is the place in which all members can experience the sisterly and brotherly relationships that should exist within the Society and where the work of the conference is organized.

The Conference Meeting is the time for self-reflection and renewal of heart, mind, and action. It is the place where all members can reflect on their work, discuss their joys and experiences, and also share any ideas or concerns they may have.

The purpose of conferences gathering together regularly is to support each person in their spiritual growth, discuss new opportunities for living out the Mission of the Society, and to strengthen the friendship between members. The Conference meeting is a sacred place of joy, love, and fellowship for those who attend.

The Manual of the Society states:

Conference meetings are privileged occasions during which members manifest Christ's love to one another and experience his healing presence. Conferences meet regularly and frequently, at least twice a month, in celebration of mutual friendship and out of a passion to serve the Lord (Rule: Part I, Article 3.3, 3.3.1 and 3.4; Part III, Statute 5). Unlike other organizations within and outside the Church, the Conference meets less to conduct business than to celebrate and deepen unity for essentially spiritual reasons.

Vincentians often profess the belief that a conference or council meeting should never last longer than one hour. While conferences that meet weekly generally have shorter meetings, there is nothing in the Rule, Manual, or bylaws of the Society that mandate the length of time that a meeting should take. If an hour allows enough time for everything on the normal agenda to be covered so be it but if things are left out or cut short to meet a sixty-minute time limit, we must forego the idea of adjourning the meeting in an hour or less.

While presidents and committee chairs must be organized, mindful of time, and take care to move their meetings along according to the agenda for the day, a meeting that is well organized and on task takes as long as it takes to deal with the items before them. There are, however, some items that can be streamlined. Keep in mind that minutes do not need to be read out loud, correspondence can be summarized and passed around, and not all cases need to be reported on.

Watching the clock, sighing, fidgeting, and/or making negative remarks about the length of time a meeting is taking is counterproductive to our Vincentian mission. If you go to a relative's or close friend's house for dinner or a special occasion, do you enter their home by saying this better not take more than an hour?

A conference meeting is a family gathering and certainly should not drag on unnecessarily, but we must remember that these are special occasions to be with and to grow with our brothers and sisters. They are a time to share. A time to laugh. A safe place to shed a tear or two. A place of encouragement and support for one another. A time together that should be celebrated and cherished.

#### **New Member Admission Process:**

The Rule of the Society Part III Statutes 3 & 4 cover the Membership and Admission process along with Member Commissioning and Renewal Ceremonies. Conferences often forget that there is a process for bringing new members into the Society and a formal ceremony marking their admission. This process allows for formation, discernment and formal admission and a celebration of a new member's admittance into the Society. ## **SVdP Thrift Stores**

## Did You Know That Our Thrift Stores Help Save the Environment?



Most of us take little if any time to think about the negative impact that the fashion and textile industries have on our economy and our environment. The textile industry is widely considered to be the second largest polluter in the world. While there may be little that the average person can to about the industry's water use, carbon emissions or consumption of fuel for fabric production and product transportation, we can make a real difference in the waste pollution caused by discarded clothing and household textiles.

According to the Secondary Materials and Recycled Textiles Association (SMART), nearly 100% of all used clothing and household textiles can be re-used or recycled: 45% are re-used as apparel; 30% are converted into industrial polishing/wiping cloths and 20% are processed into fiber to be manufactured into new products. 95% of all used clothing is recyclable, only 5% is unusable due to mildew or other contamination.

And yet, the vast majority of clothing that enters the supply chain ends up in landfills:

- Eighty-seven percent of discarded clothing is either dumped into landfills or incinerated.
- On average, Americans throw away eight-one pounds of textiles each, every year. This amounts to 26 billion pounds of textile waste in the United States alone.
- Only fifteen percent of the clothing and other household textiles discarded by American consumers is recycled or re-used.
- Synthetic textile materials take 200 years or more to completely break down when dumped into a landfill.

## Did You Know That Our Thrift Stores Help Save the Environment?

So what happens to clothing and other textiles that are donated to our SVdP Thrift stores? Clothing and other textiles donated to our thrift stores are given directly to the poor through conferences, Care Cards, and vouchers or sold to consumers at a greatly reduced cost. Clothing and other textiles that are not sold or are not in good enough condition to be re-used, are bundled and sold to "bin buyers" or recycling companies. In other words, few if any of the clothing and textile items that are donate to the our stores end up being dumped into a landfill or burned. Simply put our thrift stores provide everyone with a quick and easy way to repurpose and recycle unwanted clothing and household textiles.

You can help support our stores and the environment by spreading the word that donating used clothing and textiles to us helps everyone. Just think about this: Recycling 2.62 tons of textiles is the environmental equivalent of taking 1.3 million cars off the streets of America. This ratio is truly remarkable and clear proof that donating clothing and household textiles can make a difference in so many ways.

We can do more to help. Why not consider hosting a Conference Clothing Drive or a Thrift Store Bundle Drive?
