The first day of October signals a new year for all Vincentian councils and conferences. It is a time for new beginnings, saying goodbye to outgoing officers, and for the commissioning of new officers. It marks the end of a fiscal year, a time to complete our Annual reports and to start our yearly audits, but it is also a time for a deeper kind of reflection and evaluation. It is a perfect time to step back and evaluate your conference, its works, and its goals and to identify areas for future growth and expansion.

The Society of St. Vincent de Paul has always been committed to growth and expansion and that happens primarily through self-examination, planning, and implementation. October is the perfect time for us to stop for a moment and determine ways that we can adapt more fully to our changing world, better serve those in need, and determine how we recruit new members as we foster spiritual growth and fellowship among our existing members. Dreaming and planning brings new energy and vitality to a conference. Growth and development of our Vincentian activities keeps us current and prevents the drudgery that is often associated with unchanging routines.

Conferences that do not commit to evaluating, growing, and adapting often find themselves stagnated and in need of new members but with nothing that would attract the members they need. Through the evaluation process, conferences can; identify their strengths, find areas that need improvement, articulate the possibilities for future service areas and/or growth, and set goals for the upcoming year.

The Manual of the Society has a set of guidelines for effective conferences. These guidelines provide the perfect springboard for evaluation and planning. The basic bullet points for those guidelines are listed below.

Why not take those guidelines and use them to ask questions about your conference and how they are doing under each point? For example, the first point is that effective conferences are reachable? You might ask yourself like: Are there ways that we could be more reachable? Could we eliminate barriers or obstacles that make us hard to reach? Are we visible to our parishioners and donors? Do we regularly submit articles and contact numbers in the bulletin? Do other area charities and agencies know how to refer people to us?

#### Maintaining a Positive Relationship with Your Pastor

Since 1949, the Bishops of Phoenix and Tucson have actively supported the Society of St. Vincent de Paul and its works. Our Bishops endorse and encourage the existence and operation of the St. Vincent de Paul Society at both the Diocesan and parish levels.

Many local of our local pastors also have a positive relationship with St Vincent de Paul and see the need for helping the poor through the Society in their individual parishes. Local pastors often allow conferences to raise funds through 5th Sunday collections, poor boxes, food and clothing drives, and/or other means of securing goods or financial support.

Conferences, however, should be aware that while the Bishops of Arizona support the Society there is no requirement for a pastor to have a conference operating in their parish. The operation of a SVdP conference is always at the pleasure of the pastor and so Vincentian officers must constantly strive to have a positive relationship and to establish and maintain open lines of communication with their pastor or his appointed representative.

In order to establish and maintain a healthy relationship between the Pastor and your parish-based St Vincent de Paul conference, we suggest you do the following:

- 1. Maintain regular communications with your pastor on behalf of your conference. Meet in-person with him at least every six months.
- 2. Send your pastor a copy of your conference's Quarterly and Annual Reports as well as a short summary of your current needs, activities, and successes.
- 3. Be sure to create and maintain and atmosphere that is open, warm, and positive.
- 4. During meetings with your pastor, be sure he knows that the Society is a spiritual charitable organization founded in 1833 by lay college students. Also, share that we are the largest and longest standing charitable organization in the world currently operating in over 150 countries. The Society's goal is not only to relieve material need but to promote growth in holiness among our members as well as in those whom we serve.
- 5. Explain that we pray with the families we visit and often offer them bulletins, bibles, rosaries or other religious information and items. Stress the spiritual nature of our home visits. Explain how we prayer before, during and after each visit.
- 6. Ask your pastor if he or one of the other parish priests or deacons would be able to serve as the conference's Spiritual Advisor. If they are not available to do so, ask if they would like to be a drop in Advisor and include the pastor in the selection of a lay Spiritual Advisor.
- 7. Invite your pastor and priests to attend conference meetings whenever they are interested in attending. Make sure they know that this is an open invitation.

### Weapons Policy

# Society of St. Vincent de Paul Diocesan Council # 513 Policy Regarding Weapons

This policy applies only to employees and volunteers of the Society of St Vincent de Paul. It does not govern third-party security companies or police departments.

Employees and volunteers are prohibited from carrying lethal weapons on Society property, or while conducting Society business, at any time. Lethal weapons include, but are not limited to, firearms of any sort and knives. For individual, personal protection, mace and pepper spray are permitted for all employees and volunteers.

Security officers employed by the Society will be authorized to carry non-lethal weapons when they are on duty. Batons and pepper spray are the approved weapons for security officers. These non-lethal weapons will not be visible unless required. Due to the nature and scope of their job responsibilities, security staff must be fully trained in the proper use of the non-lethal weapons noted above, as well as de-escalation techniques.

### From the Desk of Conference Resources Committee



As we continue to deal with the economic fallout of the COVID pandemic, other government agencies and/or charitable groups see the Society as a potential source of general funds for their programs. Conference and councils are often tempted to share funds for programs that may directly or indirectly benefit those whom we serve or the community as a whole, however, the Rule of the Society clearly prohibits such contributions to non-Vincentian entities.

Statute 26 of the Rule clearly states that Vincentian funds are to be used for the works of the Society and are not to be given to other charities or shared with non-Vincentian groups.

The funds of the Society shall be used for the works of the Society, including Vincentian twinning and collaboration in payments for people we serve. <u>However, no matter how worthy the cause, funds shall not be diverted in the form of donations or contributions to other organizations or charities, except, occasionally, for other branches of the Vincentian Family. The Treasurer is charged as the responsible officer to ensure adherence after consultation with the Conference or Council.</u>

## 40<sup>th</sup> ANNUAL FALL CONFERENCE FOOD **DRIVE**

For the past 40 years the Men of Our Lady of Perpetual Help (OLPH) and the OLPH SVdP Scottsdale Conference have facilitated the Society of St. Vincent de Paul Food Drive materials. These Food Drive materials are distributed for Conference pantries. Over the years the food drive has grown to include some 70 or more SVDP conferences.

Food Drive supplies may be picked up on Friday and Saturday, September 17th and 18<sup>th</sup> from 9:00am to 12:00pm at 420 W. Watkins St. in Phoenix. All supplies can be picked up at the north door of the Food Reclamation Center. Lucy Meraz (602-850-6761) will be sending out more information in August

asking Conference Presidents to register and order their supplies.

Please check with **your Pastor** for his approval.

The Men OF OUR LADY of PERPETUAL HELP (Scottsdale) will be available to assist. The supplies will include grocery bags, holy cards, envelopes, and flyers suggesting appropriate types of food for donation by parishioners. Typically, these materials will be stapled together, distributed to parishioners one weekend, and returned with donations the following weekend.

This annual food drive allows parishioners to donate over 30,000 bags of food for our SVdP food pantries each year. In addition, donations are made that provide for food to be purchased. The total value to conference pantries is well in excess of \$1 million each year. Please conduct a food drive for your own local use, or plan to donate your excess food to be picked up by another SVdP conference of your choice.

## My Visit to Cuernavaca

#### Visit to Cuernavaca - August 2021

It has been 1 ½ years since my last visit to Cuernavaca. The pandemic in the United States and in Mexico has made travel difficult but the opportunity finally opened up and we traveled there in the early part of August. Along with me came Kevin and Harriet O'Connor, and Marc Neibergal, volunteers for the Society in Phoenix. Flying to Mexico on Friday, the 5<sup>th</sup> of August, we spent the next 9 days working with conference members to serve families and students.

Highlights of the trip included the opportunity to meet with the Vincentians and all the students receiving scholarships, meeting and working with our International President, Renato Lima de Oliveira, delivering food boxes to families in the area, the opening of a new Media Center at the Primary School in Loma Esmeralda, and assisting families and students.

#### **Meeting Scholarship Students**

On Saturday, Sunday, and Monday, students sponsored by each of the three Conferences, came to the SVDP Center to receive their monthly scholarship funds. There are a total of 137 students receiving scholarships and 10 elderly receiving living assistance. Of these, 82 have been adopted by individuals, Conferences, and Districts in Phoenix and other parts of the United States. Donors in Cuernavaca support an additional 65 students. Each donor provides a student with a scholarship and, In turn, each student writes a thank you letter to his or her sponsor and, if available, includes the grade report to show progress in school. During the pandemic, the Primary School had only on-line services for grades 1 through 6. Secondary and high school students also had access to them. Cell phones were the major source of online learning in the community. The Phoenix Council provided funds to supplement scholarships to pay for cell phone services so that students could keep up with instruction. Apparently, the extra funds helped because the students finished their respective grades.

Renato has been a Vincentian since he was 15 years old (35 years ago) and was a great example for all. With him was Luz Maria

Ramirez, President of the Council of Mexico. It was a neat coincidence and an honor to be with Renato and Luz Maria during these two very busy days. During the morning of his first day, Renato addressed the Vincentians and explained the activities of the International Council. That was followed by a presentation by Gladys Herrera, President, and Gina Ocampo, Executive Director of the Council, who outlined the structure and described the programs in Cuernavaca. I had the opportunity to describe the relationship and activities involving Phoenix and Cuernavaca, including the Scholarship Program and assistance for special projects. Following this meeting, the remainder of Renato's visit involved visiting sites to meet the families and providing assistance to them.

#### Dedication of the Media Center at the Primary School in Loma Esmeralda

Seven years ago, the State of Morelos asked St Vincent de Paul to provide food for meals for children attending the Primary School in Loma Esmeralda, a community of indigenous and Mexican families. Ever since then, the Primary School and the families of Loma Esmeralda have been a major focus for the Vincentians. In addition to food for the school and scholarships for students, St Vincent de Paul distributes monthly food packages to families. During this time, St Vincent de Paul, with the help of local organizations and Phoenix Council, has overseen the expansion of the school from three classrooms to six and has assisted in other projects at the school, as well. The Primary School had no library or area to give students access to computers. However, with donations from many, funds were raised to provide the Primary School with a media center consisting of computers with online services and a library. Up to this time, a library has been provided through the SVDP Biblioteca Movil (mobile library). Now, computer hardware, software, internet services, and a library will be provided to the students in a secure area of the school. For the first time, students will have access to many services in their school that often are taken for granted.

Prior to this, we were not sure that the children there played hop-scotch but quickly found out that in Mexico, the game is called "Avion" (Airplane); and, when it was ready, every child there had to show off his or her ability.

New books at all levels in Spanish are always welcome, and Ana Clauidia Sanchez Pinto, coordinator, and her helpers are always ready to bring new books to the children. For the past 5 years, this library has helped raise the reading level for children in Loma Esmeralda. Before the Biblioteca Movil, many children in the community had never seen a picture book or read one. Now, it is quite popular!
