Beginning Anew!



The first day of October signals a new year for all Vincentian councils and conferences. It is a time for new beginnings, saying goodbye to outgoing officers, and for the commissioning of new officers. It marks the end of a fiscal year, a time to complete our Annual reports and to start our yearly audits, but it is also a time for a deeper kind of reflection and evaluation. It is a perfect time to step back and evaluate your conference, its works, its goals and to identify areas for future growth and expansion.

The Society of S++6t. Vincent de Paul has always been committed to growth and expansion and that happens primarily through self-examination, planning, and implementation. October is the perfect time for us to stop for a moment and determine ways that we can adapt more

fully to our changing world, better serve those in need, and determine how we can best recruit new members as we continue to foster spiritual growth and fellowship among our existing members. Dreaming and planning brings new energy and vitality to a conference. Growth and development of our Vincentian activities keeps us current and prevents the drudgery that is often associated with unchanging routines.

Conferences that do not commit to evaluating, growing, and adapting often find themselves stagnant and in need of new members, but with nothing that would attract the members they need. Through the evaluation process, conferences can identify their strengths, find areas that need improvement, articulate the possibilities for future service areas and/or growth, and set goals for the upcoming year.

The Manual of the Society has a set of standards for effective conferences. These guidelines provide the perfect springboard for evaluation and planning. The basic bullet points for those standards are listed below.

Why not take those guidelines and use them to ask questions about your conference and how they are doing under each point? For example, the first point is that effective conferences are reachable? You might ask yourself things such as: Are there ways that we could be more reachable? Could we eliminate barriers or obstacles that make us hard to reach? Are we visible to our parishioners and donors? Do we regularly submit articles and contact numbers in the bulletin? Do other area charities and agencies know how to refer people to us? May we all commit to starting anew by evaluating our present and visioning our future.

GUIDELINES FOR EFFECTIVE CONFERENCES

Conference Meetings & In-Person Services

The recent COVID pandemic required the Society and its members to adapt swiftly to the need to hold conference meetings and to serve the poor while meeting local and state restrictions/mandates and protecting themselves and others. Zoom meetings and conference calls replaced our in-person meetings and most services to the poor were provided indirectly through phone calls and internet exchanges. Being able to adapt to the changing needs was one of the reasons that our Council not only survived the pandemic but, in many ways, thrived. Our donations increased and we were able to provide a record number of adaptive services including offering COVID relief funds, sack lunches, drive thru meals and electronic payments. However, as the threat of COVID infections has lessened, many conferences and councils have not switched back to in-person meetings and services.

Meeting and serving through an in-person format are at the very heart of the Society. The Rule states, "The members meet as brothers and sisters with Christ in the midst of them, in Conferences that are genuine communities of faith and love, of prayer and action. Spiritual bonds and friendship between members are essential, as is the common mission to help the poor and marginalized". (Rule Part I Article 3.3)

No Zoom or conference call can replace the intimacy of an in-person meeting. Electronic meetings do not allow us to pray in one voice, to look into each other's eyes and hearts, or to properly convey empathy and compassion. Over ninety percent of interpersonal communication is conveyed not by what we say but rather by our tone and our body language. Sitting at home behind a computer screen is often more convenient and sometimes comfortable, but the experience lacks the authenticity, warmth and connectedness of direct human contact.

Meeting face-to-face promotes unity, fosters fellowship, and sets the stage for a relaxed experience of friendship and the opportunity to work towards a shared vision. In our personal face-to-face encounters, we are more open to sharing our stories and ideas. The small talk and natural conversations we share during our in-person meetings builds closer relationships where we have the opportunity to spontaneously laugh and cry together. And our in-person conversations lead to more creativity and better problem-solving.

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Conference Meetings & In-Person Services


Throughout the history of the Society, conferences and councils have managed to meet in-person through a variety of epidemics, wars, and persecutions. Now is the time for us to show our resilience and to open our doors to in-person meetings. Yes, we are blessed by the existence of electronic devices that can connect us, but the use of those devices should be few and far between. Conferences and councils should look to hybrid meetings where those members with significant health risks, those absent from the area for long periods of time, and the homebound and ill are able to call or Zoom in but where the vast majority of the members gather in-person.

No electronic meeting can provide us with the true spirit of the Society. God created us to live and work in communities and there is no stronger community than that of the Vincentian family. It is in being face-to-face that we experience Christ in one another. It is in the presence of our fellow members that we are most supported, cared for and loved. Zoom and conference calls are inept in their ability to convey love and support for one another. So let us commit to restoring our in-person meetings and gatherings.

<u>At this time, all conferences and councils must put forth</u> every effort to meet regularly in the Vincentian in-person format set forth by our founders.

Office Commissioning

Remember that October is the time to commission new conference and council presidents and officers. Commissioning is an important rituals and makes visible the commitment made by the president and the officers to the conference/councils and the conference/councils commitment to them.



Commissioning of SVdP Conference Presidents

Spiritual Advisor: In the name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Spirit.

All: Amen

Spiritual Advisor: Let us pray together the Mission Statement of the Society of St. Vincent de Paul:

All: Inspired by Gospel values, the Society of St. Vincent de Paul, a Catholic lay organization, leads women and men to join together to grow spiritually by offering person-to-person service to those who are needy and suffering in the tradition of its founder, Blessed Frederic Ozanam, and patron, St. Vincent de Paul.

As a reflection of the whole family of God, members, who are known as Vincentians, are drawn from every ethnic and cultural background, age group and economic level. Vincentians are united in an international society of charity by their spirit of poverty, humility and sharing, which is nourished by prayer and reflection, mutually supportive gatherings and adherence to a basic Rule.

Organized locally Vincentians, witness God's love by embracing all works of charity and justice. The Society collaborates with other people of good will in relieving need and addressing its causes, making no distinction in those served because, in them, VINCENTIANS SEE THE FACE OF CHRIST.

District President: The Society of St. Vincent de Paul is made up of Conferences as its primary basic unit. The Rule teaches us that: "The members meet as brothers and sisters with Christ in the midst of them, in conferences that are genuine communities of faith and love, of prayer and action. Spiritual bonds and friendship between members are essential, as is the common mission to help the poor and marginalized. The entire Society is a true and unique worldwide Community of Vincentian Friends." (Rule 3.3)

In the spirit of Jesus, the Servant leader, the office of president is a responsibility, not an honor. It is one of service and the president is the first among equals. The Rule calls the president to "provide an encouraging atmosphere in which the talents, capacities and spiritual charism of the members are identified, developed and put to the service of the poor and the Society of St. Vincent de Paul. The president of the conference will have special responsibility for promoting Vincentian spirituality." (Rule 3.11)

And so, we gather together to pray for and to commission our new conference presidents.

Reading: Gospel according to John (13:12-17)

Spiritual Advisor: "After he had washed their feet, Jesus put his cloak back on and reclined at table once more. He said to them: "Do you understand what I just did for you? You address me as 'Teacher' and 'Lord,' and fittingly enough, for that is what I am. But if I washed your feet—I who am Teacher and Lord—then you must wash each other's feet. What I just did was to give you an example: as I have done, so you must do. I solemnly assure you, no slave is greater than his master; no messenger outranks the one who sent him. Once you know all these things, blest will you be if you put them into practice."

District President: First, let us thank our outgoing presidents for their generosity in fulfilling their duties and their faithful years of service as president of their conference. Now, my dear brothers and sisters let us ask God our Father to look lovingly upon those Vincentians who have been called to serve as our new conference presidents.

(The outgoing President then hands the leadership manual and guide booklet of St. Vincent de Paul to the new President—this year books will be mailed)

Retiring President(s): Receive this leadership manual and guide as the sign of your leadership and responsibility. May the Holy Spirit grant you a receptive mind and a loving heart so that you will come to know deeply the spirit of St. Vincent de Paul and Blessed Frederic Ozanam.

District President: May the Rule and Manual of the Society of St. Vincent de Paul, continue to guard and guide your steps as you lead the Society. And so I now ask you:

Do you promise to carry out your duties with diligence and creativity, serving the conference and those in need for the greater glory of God?

New President(s): I do, and I pray for the strength and wisdom to faithfully serve the members and those they visit.

District President: Do you promise to seek consensus and not to insist on your own opinion, to see every member as a friend, to recognize their talents, to encourage each one and to develop harmony and respect between members and to always "deepen the Vincentian spirit of friendship"?

New Presidents: I do, and I pray that we will be of one mind and one heart, so that our conference may be a sign of the presence and love of Christ in our community.

District President: Do you promise to adhere loyally to the spirit of the Society of St. Vincent de Paul, as reflected in the Manual and Rule and to promote a deeper Vincentian spirituality amongst all the members?

New President(s): I do, and I pray for the grace to be generous with my time, my possessions and myself in this mission of charity.

District President: Each of you have accepted a serious responsibility as president of your conference

I ask all of us here present to share in that responsibility by our prayers and support. For this let us seek the intercession of the Blessed Virgin Mary, Patroness of our Society, as we say together:

All: Hail Mary...

Spiritual Advisor: Prayer of Blessing and Commissioning

Let us now raise our hands in blessing over these conference presidents as we pray together:

All: May God's grace and blessing be with each of you as we commission you as the president of your conference. Let the wisdom of St. Vincent and Blessed Frederic, guard and guide you as you undertake your office.

Allow yourself to be led by the Lord. He will direct all things through you. Trust him and following His example, always act humbly, gently and in good faith, and you will see everything go well. Your responsibilities, which are many, will continue to grow but believe and trust that He will not leave a heavy burden on your back without sustaining you. He will be your strength as well as your reward for the extraordinary services you render to the Society and to the poor.

We promise our prayers and our support. Amen

SVdP Thrift Stores



Find A Volunteer!

What goes into owning and operating a successful thrift store? There are certainly many factors that go into opening and operating a success store. Ideally, a SVdP thrift store should be located in an area that has high visibility, easy access and is close to those wealthy enough to donate items and shop and to the working poor that benefit from free and/or low-cost items. The store needs to be clean, well-organized and staffed by friendly and competent employees, but one of the critical factors for the success of our Council's thrift stores is the depth and breadth of their ongoing volunteer base.

Our Diocesan Council has a strong Volunteer Services department and they do a great job in securing and placing corporate and group volunteers in our stores for special

projects and for service days but our stores also need committed and loyal individuals who show up week after week and day after day in loving service to the store and the Society's mission.

When I talk to Vincentians about helping us secure store volunteers, their response is usually something that indicates that their conference members are too busy doing conference work to help in the stores and that is a legitimate reason for not serving in the stores. After God and family, the first priority for Vincentians should always be the support of their conference but many of our store volunteers do not belong to a conference and working in one of our stores is the perfect way for them to support the Society and its works.

So where can we as Vincentians look to help recruit new volunteers for our stores? The best place to look for potential store volunteers is among your family and friends. Do you have people close to you that love the Society and it works but do not feel called to join us members? For years, one of the most faithful volunteers at the Bell Road store was the father-in-law of a conference member. Think about individuals who tried joining your conference and did not feel it was a good fit for them or who no longer are active members. These individuals are often excited about the possibility of serving the poor in a way that is more consistent, predictable and secure.

Years before I was on the Stores Committee, I went to the Bell Road store to drop off some donations. An extremely vibrant and joy filled 84-year-old volunteer came out to help me unload my car. Being several years younger, I assured her I could unload my items myself. She insisted that she help me saying that she tried to be a Vincentian and it did not work for her. Meeting the poor face-to-face was too upsetting for her and after doing a home visit she could not sleep for days. Serving in our dining rooms was even worse and she was sad until she heard about the opportunity to serve in one of our stores. The stores were her way of being part of us. She was part of the Vincentian and store family. She had friends and things that she could do to help the poor all at the same time. Being a store volunteer met her needs and ours.

Sometimes we feel like helping recruit stores volunteers would be just an unpleasant task that we do not have the time for but it is truly a Vincentian work. When we refer people or, even better yet, take them to one of our stores to see if being a volunteer is right for them, we are helping the Society and that person. God calls people to serve in many and varied ways and we as Vincentians are perfect recruiters for store volunteers. We already love the Society. We understand its mission. These are **our stores** and they function to support us and the poor. Why wouldn't we do everything in our power to make them successful?

You can make a difference by helping us find new volunteers for our stores!



How Secret Collection Funds Can Be Used?

Most Vincentians know the history of the black bag/secret collection and understand that such a collection needs to be taken up at all of our conference and council meetings, but many members and even some officers are confused about where those funds should be recorded and how they can be used. There are few if any official documents or articles on this issue, leaving conferences and councils bewildered in regards to the nature of these funds.

If we go to the Rule and the Manual, it is clear that funds collected by the Society belong to and are for the use of the Society regardless of their source. The Manual states, "Donations to Conferences — whether they come from church collections, from the members themselves, from benefactors, or from fundraising efforts — are meant to address today's needs". The phrase "are meant to address today's needs" points to the use of funds for the current needs of the poor. So that brings up the question, if that is true should secret collection funds be used solely for direct or indirect assistance to our neighbors in need (client aid)?

The answer is yes and no. While once donated, these funds certainly no longer belong to the individual members, they do belong to the conference or council as a collective group. Thus, our secret collection funds can be used to support a broader view of Vincentian activities and works which include works of spirituality, formation and fellowship that enhance the conference members and their vocational call. The main difference between general donor funds and member funds is that the members of a conference or council regularly have in-person opportunities to express their collective intent concerning the use of their donations.

It is important to understand that if secret collection funds are to be spent outside of the general works of the conference, their designated purpose must be articulated in advance. For example, many conferences vote annually on how their secret collection funds can be spent. Some conferences use those funds for festival celebrations, mass intentions, cards and flowers for members during times of illness or the death of a loved one. Some conferences use those funds as donations to a higher council for a special program like our One At A Time, Ozanam Manor or Diocesan Council Aid programs. And other conferences use the funds for special retreats, trainings, SVdP assemblies, and other formation activities.

While secret collections funds may be used for more general Vincentian activities, they can never be used to purchase gifts for the clergy, parish staff, or given to charitable groups and activities outside of the Vincentian family. Giving secret collection funds to one of the parish priests to send to his parish overseas or to make a contribution to the parish itself violates the Rule of the Society and is not a choice a conference or council can make. If members want to support the parish or the charitable interests of their pastor or other clergy, they must do that outside of the conference or council collections and/or activities.

The mission of the Society is for its members to grow in holiness through fellowship and service to the poor. Our secret collection funds must always be used to support that mission. Each conference or council must regularly pray and discern how they will use their secret collection funds to promote our essential elements, the poor and one another.

Society of St. Vincent de Paul Phoenix Diocesan Council Aid Program (formerly referred to as Diocesan Council twinning)

The purpose is to identify poor Conferences that need financial assistance and to authorize that those identified conferences will receive funds that have been allocated for this purpose. (Committee Charter approved by the Diocesan Council Board 09/2017)

History of the Program: For more than forty years, the SVdP Diocesan Council of Phoenix has recognized that some conferences associated with our Council, through no fault of their own, do not have access to sufficient donor funds from their parish and/or District to operate as a conference.

While many conferences may from time to time be in need of some type of financial assistance there are certain conferences that cannot provide any financial help to the poor without reliable funding from sources other than their Parish and/or their District Council.

For the past several years, funds for this Diocesan Council program have come from a portion of the fees charged to conferences by the Food Reclamation for food boxes and direct contributions from conferences, District Councils and private donors. Funds accumulated in this account are distributed to approved conferences in "good standing" at or before each Diocesan Council General Membership Meeting (GMM).

Applications are accepted annually starting in December and must be submitted to Vincentian Support Services (VSS) on or before a date set by the Conference Resource Committee.

Conference requests for Diocesan Council Aid are evaluated on, but not limited to, the general standards and factors listed below. The committee will evaluate the listed items in light of the conference, its history, current area conditions, and in context of the responses and explanations provided on the application and during the interview process.

In addition to reviewing the conference's application, Annual Report, interview and recommendation from their District president, the committee will make their decisions in consultation with the Diocesan Council president.

Over the course of the past Fiscal Year the conference:

- Had a full slate of officers
- Had a Spiritual Advisor
- Held regular conference meetings at least twice a month
- Had a set of approved written Conference guidelines that were distributed to all members
- Attended at least 80% of their District Council and 50% of the Diocesan Council's General Membership Meetings

The standards and items listed above are provided to increase understanding of the program and the factors that will be used in the decisionmaking process. This year, applications for Diocesan Council Aid (formerly referred to as Diocesan Council Twinning) will be due no later than Thursday, December 29th, 2022. Steve Zabilski speech to the SVdP General Membership meeting – September 17, 2022

Many years ago I was reading a book, and, as I often do, I looked first at the dedication page to see who the author wished to acknowledge with some special words. This particular book was rather odd, the dedication merely read: "To Elizabeth...." That surprised me. After all, an author is eloquent with words, someone who breathes life and wisdom into otherwise blank sheets of paper. It only dawned on me later, that in this particular case there simply were no words that would suffice. That's how I feel this morning. There are no words that even begin to express my feelings, my gratitude, my emotions, and my love for all of you. None. (dot, dot, dot) With that said, please bear with me these next few minutes.

Almost 26 years ago, on Saturday morning, December 21, 1996, I stood at this very spot and addressed more than 400 Vincentians who had gathered for their December General Membership meeting. SVdP had hired me as executive director a month earlier, and to say that I was nervous that morning (*as I am today*) would be quite accurate. I wanted to be liked. I wanted to be accepted. I wanted to become a member of your Vincentian family. How quickly those 26 years have flown by.

Thank you to the wonderful Vincentians with whom it has been my privilege to work with all these years. My special thanks to that Board of Directors who took a huge chance on an unknown 39-year-old accountant, and who offered me the opportunity to become a Vincentian. I especially wish to note the five presidents for whom I have been blessed to work under: Nancy Spencer, Steve Jenkins, Joe Riley, Frank Barrios, and Steve Attwood. Each provided me with invaluable advice, wisdom, counsel, perspective, grace, and forgiveness this past quarter century. Working for them gave me a direct line to Vincent de Paul, to Frederic Ozanam, Louise de Marillac, Rosalie Rendu, and, to the Holy Spirit. Thank you to all the District and Conference presidents who were so gracious to invite me to your meetings where the real work of our Society takes place. Thank you to our founders Matt Scott and Dan O'Meara whom it was my privilege to know. (Ask me some time about my attempt at humor with a joke about used car salesman, only to be later told that Dan sold used cars. Dan was in the room that day, my first week in fact, when I embarrassed myself. He was kind enough to smile and never mention it.) Thank you to my wife Denise and my three little babies (who somehow are now grown adults). Denise is with us this morning and I would ask her to please stand so that you can acknowledge and thank her for her support - support started my very first day when I called her at 6 p.m. and said I wouldn't be home for dinner, a call she would receive many hundreds of times. And Thank You to everyone in this room today. Twenty-six years ago when standing here I noted how special it was going to be working with angels and saints. (A few of you chuckled - but I was right!!) God bless each of you for being those angels and saints all these many years.

These past few months people have asked me "What Stands Out Most" during my time at SVDP. The list is endless, but since my time is brief, here are three observations:

First: Our Council is a family. We celebrate together, we work together, we pray together, we play together, and we cry together. So many of you have invited me into your homes. I've met your children and grandchildren. I've attended graduations, weddings, birthdays and Christmas parties. And funerals. Too many funerals – especially in recent years. But our family never comes together better than it does in times of sorrow. That is what Vincentians do. We are indeed a Family.

Second: God brought you to SVDP. Think about that, God wants "YOU" here. In God's infinite wisdom, in His plan for creation, each of you is a critical part of the Society of SVDP-Phoenix Diocesan Council, the largest Council in the world. We would not be the organization we are today if you did not say Yes to God's call. You are changing our Neighborhoods. You are changing our Nation. You are changing our World. God brought "YOU" to SVdP.

Third: And I am almost embarrassed to admit, but it took me probably 10 years to really understand that the second half of our mission statement is so important, is so unique. Yes, we are here to deliver food boxes, pay rents, serve meals, to provide showers and haircuts and clothing and counseling, shoes and bikes and wheelchairs and toiletries, medical and dental care, and much, much more. But the second half of our mission proclaims: "We are here to provide others the opportunity to grow spiritually and to be of service." This is what distinguishes SVdP from the rest of the world. Come to any conference meeting, volunteer even one time in our kitchen or dining rooms, and you are a changed individual. We often hear people say I came to SVdP one person, I left another. That is our true blessing. SVdP exists to provide EVERYONE the opportunity to grow spiritually & to be of service.

I am not leaving SVDP - merely changing roles. The coming six months will allow me to focus my time and attention on something that excites me - visiting with our donors, our volunteers, our Vincentians. With You. Then this April, I will join the Virginia Piper Charitable Trust as its CEO. The Piper Trust is an organization I have been involved with for 17 years, and no group has done more for our Council, and for the people we serve than the Piper Trust. This new role will enable me to serve as a member of our Board or Directors, to stay actively involved with the work of the Society. With each of You. Thanks to Steve Attwood for extending this invitation to join our Board next April when my role as a SVDP employee ends. I do understand this appointment requires the approval of the full Board of Directors, so I commit this morning to bring donuts and bagels to every meeting to earn your vote!!!

The book of Ecclesiastes tells us: "There is a time for everything" and exactly two weeks from today it will be Shannon Clancy's time to serve as our new leader. Shannon is no stranger to SVDP having worked with our Council for almost 20 years. I first met Shannon when she and her husband, Dan, toured this Center in 2002. A native of Phoenix. Shannon is the oldest of four children. She attended St. Francis grade school and Xavier high school where she excelled as a student and an athlete. She then attended the University of Notre Dame, graduating with honors with a degree in English. In her spare time there, Shannon tutored students - In calculus! That's right, this English major tutored calculus students. I'm quite sure there's no other English major on the planet who can make a similar claim. Shannon went on to the University of Maryland and earned a Masters Degree in Psychology. Then she did what everyone does who graduates college, Shannon set her career aside, and instead entered the Jesuit Volunteer program where she volunteered serving others for an entire year. Speaking with Shannon that fortuitus day in 2002 when she toured our Center, I learned that Dan and she had just left their successful jobs in Baltimore to move home to Phoenix into the house she grew up in where her father, Ken, was dying of cancer. Shannon wanted her two young children to know their grandfather, and her father to know his grandchildren. With no jobs, with no place to live other than mom and dads, Shannon and Dan trusted God's divine providence.

Shannon's first role with SVdP was as a part-time grant writer. Then she became a full-time grant writer. Then a Development Officer, Senior Development Officer, Director of Development, Chief Philanthropy Officer, and finally the newly created position of Associate CEO. Along the way Shannon added the title of Chief Covid Officer where she expertly navigated our Council through VERY challenging times these past two-and-a-half years.

If you attended one of our Restoring Hope Community Breakfast's these past 17 years, Shannon was the person who not only brought this idea to us. She was also the producer, the director, the screenwriter, the video coordinator, and the talent finder, along with being the person who so eloquently asked each of us at the end of the program to make that all-important financial commitment. (How could anyone ever say no to Shannon Clancy!!) Shannon worked closely with the Piper Trust to greatly expand our fundraising efforts, leading to our first capital campaign in more than 20 years, and her leadership with Creighton University has brought hundreds of students and doctors to our Clinic, transforming health care in the Valley.

Shannon has taught us to assume positive intent, to dream BIG, to bless and release, to seek first to understand, to listen – to really listen, to never give up, and so much more. Shannon is not perfect however: She tries too hard, worries too much, cares too much, and works too hard – often late into the night and virtually every weekend. During the economic collapse in 2008, Shannon was the first person to voluntarily reduce her salary when funds were scarce, and she did the same in 2020 at the onset of the Covid pandemic. As you would suspect, other organizations, local and national, have tried to hire Shannon away from SVdP - but she always said NO. She is a Vincentian in her heart and in her soul. When you see Shannon today, and in the coming weeks and months, be sure to thank her for her many years of service and sacrifice.

In Closing, there is one more thing. I promise I won't ask for a gift to the Vincentian endowment – next week maybe - but not today. What I ask this morning is that the very same love and kindness, respect and patience, forgiveness and gratitude that you have shown me these past 9,384 days you also extend to Shannon. I know you will, for you are Vincentians, and that is the Vincentian way. SVDP will become an even better organization this October 1. I couldn't be happier, and YOU couldn't have chosen a better leader. We clearly see the hand of God at work 20 years ago when He inspired Shannon to tour our facility on that special day.

Finally, I cannot conclude without apologizing for my many shortcomings: My impatience. My poor judgements. For always being in a hurry. For often being late. For my poor attempts at humor. But please, please, know that each of you has my sincerest thanks, my profound admiration and respect, my daily prayers, and my deep, deep love. I have treasured these days as your CEO. And I will always treasure you. I often think of that book that was dedicated: "To Elizabeth..." (dot, dot, dot) for whom there were no words, And I say this morning: "To You, my wonderful Vincentian Family..."


News from St. Elizabeth Seton


