

Commissioning of SVdP Conference Presidents

Spiritual Advisor: In the name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Spirit.

All: Amen

Spiritual Advisor: Let us pray together the Mission Statement of the Society of St. Vincent de Paul:

All: Inspired by Gospel values, the Society of St. Vincent de Paul, a Catholic lay organization, leads women and men to join together to grow spiritually by offering person-to-person service to those who are needy and suffering in the tradition of its founder, Blessed Frederic Ozanam, and patron, St. Vincent de Paul.

As a reflection of the whole family of God, members, who are known as Vincentians, are drawn from every ethnic and cultural background, age group and economic level. Vincentians are united in an international society of charity by their spirit of poverty, humility and sharing, which is nourished by prayer and reflection, mutually supportive gatherings and adherence to a basic Rule.

Organized locally Vincentians, witness God's love by embracing all works of charity and justice. The Society collaborates with other people of good will in relieving need and addressing its causes, making no distinction in those served because, in them, VINCENTIANS SEE THE FACE OF CHRIST.

District President: The Society of St. Vincent de Paul is made up of Conferences as its primary basic unit. The Rule teaches us that: "The members meet as brothers and sisters with Christ in the midst of them, in conferences that are genuine communities of faith and love, of prayer and action. Spiritual bonds and friendship between members are essential, as is the common mission to help the poor and marginalized. The entire Society is a true and unique worldwide Community of Vincentian Friends." (Rule 3.3)

In the spirit of Jesus, the Servant leader, the office of president is a responsibility, not an honor. It is one of service and the president is the first among equals. The Rule calls the president to "provide an encouraging atmosphere in which the talents, capacities and spiritual charism of the members are identified, developed and put to the service of the poor and the Society of St. Vincent de Paul. The president of the conference will have special responsibility for promoting Vincentian spirituality." (Rule 3.11)

And so, we gather together to pray for and to commission our new conference presidents.

Reading: Gospel according to John (13:12-17)

Spiritual Advisor: "After he had washed their feet, Jesus put his cloak back on and reclined at table once more. He said to them: "Do you understand what I just did for you? You address me as 'Teacher' and 'Lord,' and fittingly enough, for that is what I am. But if I washed your feet—I who am Teacher and Lord—then you must wash each other's feet. What I just did was to give you an example: as I have done, so you must do. I solemnly assure you, no slave is greater than his master; no messenger outranks the one who sent him. Once you know all these things, blest will you be if you put them into practice."

District President: First, let us thank our outgoing presidents for their generosity in fulfilling their duties and their faithful years of service as president of their conference.

Now, my dear brothers and sisters let us ask God our Father to look lovingly upon those Vincentians who have been called to serve as our new conference presidents.

(The outgoing President then hands the leadership manual and guide booklet of St. Vincent de Paul to the new President—this year books will be mailed)

Retiring President(s): Receive this leadership manual and guide as the sign of your leadership and responsibility. May the Holy Spirit grant you a receptive mind and a loving heart so that you will come to know deeply the spirit of St. Vincent de Paul and Blessed Frederic Ozanam.

District President: May the Rule and Manual of the Society of St. Vincent de Paul, continue to guard and guide your steps as you lead the Society. And so I now ask you:

Do you promise to carry out your duties with diligence and creativity, serving the conference and those in need for the greater glory of God?

New President(s): I do, and I pray for the strength and wisdom to faithfully serve the members and those they visit.

District President: Do you promise to seek consensus and not to insist on your own opinion, to see every member as a friend, to recognize their talents, to encourage each one and to develop harmony and respect between members and to always "deepen the Vincentian spirit of friendship"?

New Presidents: I do, and I pray that we will be of one mind and one heart, so that our conference may be a sign of the presence and love of Christ in our community.

District President: Do you promise to adhere loyally to the spirit of the Society of St. Vincent de Paul, as reflected in the Manual and Rule and to promote a deeper Vincentian spirituality amongst all the members?

New President(s): I do, and I pray for the grace to be generous with my time, my possessions and myself in this mission of charity.

District President: Each of you have accepted a serious responsibility as president of your conference

I ask all of us here present to share in that responsibility by our prayers and support. For this let us seek the intercession of the Blessed Virgin Mary, Patroness of our Society, as we say together:

All: Hail Mary...

Spiritual Advisor: Prayer of Blessing and Commissioning

Let us now raise our hands in blessing over these conference presidents as we pray together:

All: May God's grace and blessing be with each of you as we commission you as the president of your conference. Let the wisdom of St. Vincent and Blessed Frederic, guard and guide you as you undertake your office.

Allow yourself to be led by the Lord. He will direct all things through you. Trust him and following His example, always act humbly, gently and in good faith, and you will see everything go well. Your responsibilities, which are many, will continue to grow but believe and trust that He will not leave a heavy burden on your back without sustaining you. He will be your strength as well as your reward for the extraordinary services you render to the Society and to the poor.

We promise our prayers and our support. Amen

Our Transformative Home Visits

It is the calling of all Christians to grow in holiness; to become "perfect, just as your Father is perfect."

But how? Aristotle observed that to become a builder, you build. By

extension, he reasoned, to become a virtuous person, you do virtuous acts. He spoke of the cardinal, or human, virtues. You become courageous, for example, by behaving courageously.

But how can we perform perfect acts?

Vincentians are certainly people of action. We cherish St. Vincent's call to "love God with the strength of our arms and the sweat of our brow."

Even Ozanam, the academic, the intellectual, declared that "religion serves less to think than to act," and we are called to acts of charity; serving our neighbor, as our Rule says, "for love alone."

It is in our acts of charity that we begin to "will in all things what God wills," as St. Vincent taught. The more we seek to fulfill God's will before our own, the closer we are drawn to perfect union with Him.

As Vincentians, our primary act of charity is the home visit. We receive His grace in our home visits in two different dimensions. First, the joyful grace of having fulfilled what our Savior asked us to do; like a child bursting with pride at having cleaned up his toys without being asked. Gaudete in Domino! Second, and more deeply, we receive His transformational grace; we become as the Apostle tells us, "a new creation."

Love itself is an act of will – to put the needs of another before our own. Our home visits are

indispensable to our vocation. Through them, we serve both the will and the person of Christ, and in doing so, we are transformed.

That is what Blessed Frédéric meant when he wrote that "visiting the poor should be the means and not the end of our association."

Transporting Our Neighbors in Need

No act of charity is foreign to the Society. It includes any form of help that alleviates suffering or deprivation and promotes human dignity and personal integrity in all their dimensions. (Part I: 1.3)

From its earliest days, the Society held that "no work of charity is foreign to the Society." With this foundational belief at the forefront of our mission, it is only logical that many of our neighbors in need often require assistance with transportation. So, questions often arise concerning the feasibility and requirements for transporting those whom we serve.

While Conference and Council guidelines and decisions determine if neighbors in need can be transported by Vincentians from that group, there are some universal requirements that must be met. First and foremost, any direct contact with those whom we serve including transporting neighbors must be done by two Vincentians. Secondly, minors may not be transported unless they are accompanied by a parent or guardian. Next, the driver must be licensed, insured and the owner of the vehicle being used to transport our neighbors.

Vincentians must also remember that Federal law prohibits the transportation of individuals across state lines who do not have the proper documentation regarding citizenship. And finally, it is suggested that a Transportation Release of Liability waiver be signed by at least one of the adults being transported.

When deciding whether or not to allow members to transport neighbors, a Conference or Council should consider both safety and liability issues. The general rule for auto and liability insurance is that the coverage for the vehicle being driven is always in place. So, for a personal car, the Vincentian's own policy would be primary. The SVdP Phoenix Diocesan Council's auto coverage would only come into play if and when damages or awards exceeded the owner's coverage. The Diocesan Council's general liability coverage could be applicable depending on the circumstances of the case.

Conferences and Councils should first consider all the possible alternatives regarding transportation of neighbors including gas vouchers, bus tickets, taxi services, medical and elder services, and private transportation companies including UBER and LYF before deciding to provide direct transportation services to our neighbors. Some transportation companies will allow a Conference or Council to set up and pay for rides electronically.

Transportation can be a valuable and needed resource for many of the individuals and families we serve, so Conferences and Councils need to make decisions about how best to provide this service while keeping in mind personal and corporate liability, safety and cost. Even if Conference or Council guidelines allow for private transportation of neighbors by two Vincentians, each member has the right to make their own decision about providing such services. As St. Vincent de Paul said, "Love is inventive to infinity" and there are many viable transportation options available for us to use to meet the transportation needs of those whom we serve.

Please read this form carefully and be aware that in consideration for transportation that you will be expressly assuming the risk and legal liability and waiving and releasing all claims for injuries, damages or loss which you might sustain as a result of said services, including but not limited to, vehicle operations and boarding and exiting the vehicle.

I recognize and acknowledge that the Society of St. Vincent de Paul Diocesan Council and their affiliated Conferences are neither a common carrier nor in the business of providing transportation services to the public or to those whom we serve. I further recognize and acknowledge that there are certain risks of physical injury to passengers, and I voluntarily agree to assume the full risk of any injuries, damages or loss, regardless of severity, that I may sustain as a result of participating in any activities connected with or associated with receiving transportation, including, but not limited to, injuries, damages and loss. I further agree to waive and relinquish all claims and hold harmless all Vincentians, volunteers and employees (hereinafter collectively referred to as "Party").

I do hereby fully release and forever discharge the Party from any and all claims for injuries, damages or loss that I may have or which may accrue to me and arising out of, connected with, or in any way associated with said transportation services.

I further agree that this agreement shall be governed by the laws of the State of Arizona. I have read and fully understand the above waiver and release of all claims.

Commissioning is an important ritual and makes visible the commitment made by the president and the officers to the conference/councils and the conference/councils commitment to them.

National Assembly in St. Louis – Time to Register is Running Out

The SVdP National Assembly in St. Louis is just around the corner. Please complete the form included in this Newsletter if you plan on attending. Fax or scan and email that form as soon as possible. Funds to help pay for the registration, hotel and/or air fare are available to a few first-time attendees but you need to apply soon.

The Western Region is also offering scholarship funds to attend the Assembly for first-time attendees in leadership roles, however, our Council must submit their names to the Region by mid -July.

This is a great event and one that helps us to grow in our Vincentian vocation. It is also a perfect way for us to network and promote the Assembly that will be held here in 2024. Join the group from Phoenix that will be traveling to St. Louis. It is where it all began.

Remember to be in "Good Standing" a Conference must:

- Hold in-person meetings at least twice a month. Hybrid meetings with a combination of inperson and remote attendance to accommodate the needs of homebound members may be conducted, however, members attending from out of the parish area must meet all full member requirements in order to vote.
- Have an active Spiritual Advisor and include Opening and Closing prayer and a Spiritual reflection at every meeting.
- Have a full slate of conference officers that meet the full enhanced member requirements.
- Follow the SVdP Meeting Agenda for all meetings.
- Have Secretary minutes and a Treasurer's Report at each meeting.
- Obtain verification that all members, volunteers & employees are Safe Environment compliant and approved.
- Provide person-to-person services to our neighbors in need and, as often as possible, through Home Visits
- Conduct home and pantry visits in pairs.
- Be represented at 80% of their District Council and 50% of the Diocesan General Membership Meetings.
- Complete and submit Quarterly and Annual Reports in a timely fashion.

St. Elizabeth Seton Conference



We have an advocate for the poor among our members. Through the years, she has held almost all offices, including President. She is the current treasurer and continues to be a force in helping those in need. When the Pandemic hit, our volunteers who served meals at Santa Teresita dispersed. Our conference had a dedicated team serving for years, so we were caught off guard. For the present, we recruited members and covered by serving the poor through the front door. The force differed in recruits weekly, but we were able to feed those who came. Slowly, we were able to bring the needy back into the dining room where they could shelter for a time. As our conference got more

involved, we started to understand the conditions our needy were living under. With weather conditions changing, our advocate saw the need for more assistance. She started a coat drive in our parish as December was cold and rainy. She also put out a request on Next Door.com and found a great many who wanted to help. She brought in 19 SVdP boxes of coats with 2 boxes for Santa Teresita neighbors and 17 going downtown to help those living on the streets. She continued to get more coats on Next Door throughout the month.

June came along and she came up with a drive for jeans and T-shirts. Again, with help from members and parishioners, 20 boxes of goods were received, over 2,000 items. The goods were distributed to the needy who took part in the Santa Teresita Thursday food service, and some went to the downtown location. With the rains and cold of June invading the campsites, there was a desperate need for dry clothing of all kinds to replace their rain-soaked belongings. Our conference, and our parish gave generously.



There had also been a drive for dog items in which we delivered 2 SUV.s with dog beds, leashes, collars,

food, kennels, and dog toys. This was to assist the homeless who have their animals with them.

A September drive is being planned for shoes and socks for our needy. Our advocate is bringing in a co-sharing helper to assist and keep these drives a part of our conference mission. We at our conference have Vincentians who continue to work extremely hard to make a difference in both our conference and our world. God bless our advocate and each and every one of our conference team who bring their special skills to do God's work in helping those in need.

30th Anniversary Celebration for Our Lady of the Desert Conference

Dolan Springs, an unincorporated town, was developed from raw land in 1959. Our Lady of the Desert Mission, an offshoot of St. Mary's in Kingman, started in 1972. Mass was celebrated in private homes until the Dolan Springs Community Council, then called the Lake Mohave Ranchos Community Council, building was erected Mass would then be held there.

In the fall of 1983, the Mission had enough money to start construction of the church building. When word got out the Catholics were building a church, men and women from all over the community showed up to help build. The first Mass was celebrated on 12/8/83 and the church was completely finished by the Summer of 1984.





Bishop O'Brien dedicated the mission on October 21, 1984. He was surprised there was a church to be dedicated and that the community was debt free. The Conference was aggregated on July 12, 1993. Over the years many volunteers have helped to carry out the mission of St. Vincent de Paul.

In honor of the 30th Anniversary of the Conference, a special event was held on June 24, 2023,

It was a full day of activities including, a tour of the Conference facility of the Pantry and Thrift Store, Mass and a celebratory Dinner and Silent Auction at the VFW, with the

Dale Gillespie Blues Project providing the music. Dinner was catered by the Kingman Cracker Barrel restaurant, which was a first in Dolan Springs. Dignitaries included the Phoenix SVdP Phoenix Council CEO Shannon Clancy, CFO Pat Donaldson, SVdP Warehouse Supervisor Dave Lucchi and the Vincentian Support Services team, along with various donors, members of the community and volunteers. It was extremely successful in light of the corporate staff recognizing the uniqueness of the Dolan Springs location and lack of resources. They promised to double the food allotment received from SVdP and help in whatever way they could to assist our neighbors.

Veronica Rios struggled for 18-months with both homelessness and health issues. She was in need of two knee replacements because of severe

arthritis, while also trying to raise and control her four-year-old autistic son; "my little one is ADHD with autism. It was hard for us to find someplace to stay and settle because other people don't approve of how he acts," she said.

But thanks to a new medication, her son's demeanor has improved and is under control. And so is her mental outlook. She now has a place to call her own, thanks to St. Vincent de Paul. "Within two weeks of reaching out to St. Vincent de Paul, I got a place to live. St. Vincent de Paul also helped me with my move-in and now I get to shop for furniture," she added.

Needless to say, Veronica and her daughter, Augustina, were excited to shop for furniture at a Phoenix St. Vincent de Paul Thrift Store for their apartment. "We have nothing in the apartment right now," Veronica offered. "Nothing at all, just our own clothes" she added. "It is exciting," Augustina chimed in. "We get to choose everything and have an actual home. It will feel like a real home and we can continue to grow and build and move forward," she continued.

A day after shopping, a St. Vincent de Paul crew delivered and set up her furniture in her apartment. A tearful Veronica was overwhelmed with emotion: "I'm happy. I'm grateful. Grateful to lay our heads on a bed. Be able to sit down on a couch and watch tv and sit as a family and talk," she said as her voice cracked fighting through the tears. "I'm just happy my kids will be okay. We're going to be okay and I'll have an opportunity to get back on my feet."

We are grateful to be able to share stories like Veronica's one of our Bringing Hope Home (BHH) program recipients.






