Mistaken for Jesus!



Matthew Kelly, a popular Catholic writer, opens his book *Rediscover Jesus* with a touching example of Christian kindness. In this story, a businessman and his team members are running out of a building in Brooklyn after a successful meeting. In their haste to catch an available taxi, they knock over a fruit stand. One of the team members named Paul notices that the owner of the stand is blind and has tears running down her face. He tells his team to go on without him and he turns around to help the woman pick up her stand and collect the fruit that has fallen on the ground. He carefully sorts the damaged fruit from the fruit that is still good enough to be sold and hands her enough money to cover the cost of the damaged fruit.

As he walks away in search of another taxi, the woman calls out to him inquiring if he is Jesus. Somewhat startled he replies, "No, why?" The woman explains that she was just wondering because as she heard her fruit falling on the sidewalk, she prayed and asked for Jesus to help her and in an instant he was there.

This team member did what Vincentians across the globe do everyday. We receive a call or see someone or some group in need and respond by stopping and offering whatever assistance we can give. The man in this story did not change the woman's blindness or provide her with a better source of income, but he alone stopped and reached out to do what he could to help her in that moment. His teammates and hundreds of other people simply went about their own business with little thought of this woman and her needs.

As Vincentians, we often lose sight of how much impact even the simplest act of kindness can have on others. Many of the families who reach out to us have physical and financial needs far beyond what we can provide. It can seem like we are doing very little to help them if we can only pay part of a utility bill or rent, bring them a modest food box or sit and listen to the story of a family torn apart by illness, death or deportation. But in that moment, like this young man, we can bring them the love of Christ and the compassion of other human beings.

We have all heard how the greatest gift we bring to the poor and needy is the gift of ourselves, but do we really believe that? If that is true why do we so often struggle when all we can give to a family is a visit and a prayer? In the example above, Paul's greatest gift was turning around and offering a helping hand. It is simple but powerful when we take the time to stop and care. St. Teresa of Calcutta reminds us that we are not called to do great things but simple things with great love.

Love, kindness, respect and compassion must always be the gifts we offer first. Let us keep in mind that when we go out on a home visit, work in a dining room, a thrift store, one of our clinics or the ministry to the homeless, that many of the people that we encounter have prayed for Jesus to help them. Will they see Him in us? Are we bringing the joy and peace of Jesus to everyone we encounter? Ask yourself do people see the face and hands of Christ coming through my attitude and actions? "When was the last time someone confused you for Jesus?"



The Light from Within

Saint Vincent de Paul famously said that it is our vocation to “*set people’s hearts on fire, to do what the Son of God did. He came to set the world on fire in order to inflame it with His love.*” [CCD XII:215] These are inspirational “marching orders”, but what, in a practical sense, do they mean? How do we go about lighting that fire?

As always, our patron teaches that we must focus first on the interior. If we wish to set the world on fire, in other words, we must do so using the fire within our own hearts. When we examine the fire in our hearts, we recognize very quickly that our love, our charity, must be truly all-consuming. This is the love, the charity, that sets the world on fire.

Vincent asks us to examine our charity by its effects. What are the things we do, the ways in which we behave that result from our charity? How will it be known to others (and to ourselves)?

The first thing animated by charity is to do to others as you would have them do to you. How simple that sounds! It is so obviously good as a sentiment that virtually everybody in our culture knows this teaching, from children to the aged, and to one extent or another we measure our acts of kindness by this measure. True charity in our hearts is more than a disposition to kindness. Instead, we cannot help but “to do for our neighbor the good that a person has the right to expect from a faithful friend.” [Ibid, 216]

Another effect of our charity is that we bear with one another. No one on earth is perfect; everybody has imperfections and faults. Vincent calls us to examine our own faults, our own failings, and our own weaknesses first. When we realize how much we need the forbearance of others, we will naturally be more willing to bear with the neighbor, who in no case is more in need of mercy and forbearance than we are. As our Rule says, because we are conscious of our own frailty and weakness, our hearts beat with the heartbeats of the poor, and so we do not judge them. [Rule, Part I, 1.9]

In charity, we need not learn to empathize, because we simply “*can’t see someone suffering without suffering along with him, or see someone cry without crying as well. This is an act of love, causing people to enter one another’s hearts and to feel what they feel...*” [CCD XII:221]

In charity, our love for the neighbor is for God’s sake, and our love for God is for the neighbor’s sake, for who loves another has fulfilled the law. Charity is the light within us, the source of the flame that lights the world on fire.

Structure & Governance

The base and foundational unit of the Society of St. Vincent de Paul is the Conference. The membership of each Conference owns and directs the activities of that group. While Councils may have Executive Boards and budgets, Conferences do not. Within the parameters of the Rule and existing bylaws, the membership of a given Conference is in control of all operational matters. The members are called to make decisions through a process of prayer, discussion and consensus. If consensus on a given matter cannot be achieved, a formal vote may be taken. The Conference president in consultation with the Conference members sets the agenda and oversees all meetings with a deep commitment to following the will of the Conference membership itself.

Financial requests for aid to the needy are presented to the Conference for approval. Conference guidelines may preauthorize Home Visit teams to make payments up to a preset amount but requests for funding assistance over that amount should be approved by the membership not by an officer or budget/financial subcommittee. Conferences should always keep in mind that we are called to help the needy that present themselves when they present themselves. Budgeting how much assistance will be given out each week or month is contrary to the Rule of our Society. As Vincentians, we are called to help as many of the poor as our current finances allow when the requests are made and then to wait for God and our donors provide us with more resources.

Helping Outside of a Conference's Boundaries

A parish-based Conference's first priority must always be to serve the poor within their own boundaries. According to National Council of the St. Vincent de Paul, "Assistance should be provided to our friends in need in the community in which the parish Conference is located." Neighbors seeking assistance who live in the area of another Conference should be referred to their Conference. If they live in an area where there is no Conference, a Conference may choose to serve them but should only do so after they have helped all the neighbors who have called for assistance within their area.

Conference Resources (continued)

If a Conference wishes to help someone living within the boundaries of another Conference, accepted protocol dictates that the President of that Conference contact the other Conference President and ask for permission to do so. This case often happens when a person is a parishioner in an area other than the parish nearest to their residence. In some cases, the two Conferences may share in the services or funding of assistance. Information on the services and resources given should be recorded by both Conferences.

Conferences with more resources than are needed by the neighbors within their boundaries are encouraged to share their time, goods and funds with other needy Conferences, after all, we are all one family.

Remember to be in “Good Standing” a Conference must:

- Hold in-person meetings at least twice a month. Hybrid meetings with a combination of in-person and remote attendance to accommodate the needs of homebound members may be conducted, however, members attending from out of the parish area must meet all full member requirements in order to vote.
- Have an active Spiritual Advisor and include Opening and Closing prayer and a Spiritual reflection at every meeting.
- Have a full slate of conference officers that meet the full enhanced member requirements.
- Follow the SVdP Meeting Agenda for all meetings.
- Have Secretary minutes and a Treasurer’s Report at each meeting.
- Obtain verification that all members, volunteers & employees are Safe Environment compliant and approved.
- Provide person-to-person services to our neighbors in need and, as often as possible, through Home Visits
- Conduct home and pantry visits in pairs.
- Be represented at 80% of their District Council and 50% of the Diocesan General Membership Meetings.
- Complete and submit Quarterly and Annual Reports in a timely fashion.

BRICKS to build the foundation

Thrift Store Bundle Sunday or Fill A Truck Drive

Our Thrift Stores need your help. Their inventories are in constant need of replenishment. Items that are always needed are furniture, appliances and clothing. Your Conference can help by organizing a *Bundle Sunday* or *Fill A Truck Drive*.

A *Bundle Sunday* or *Fill A Truck Drive* is conducted over a few days or a weekend where your Conference has one or two of our SVdP donation trucks parked in your parish parking lot. During designated days and times, your Conference members collect items donated by your parishioners and area residents.

If your Conference decides to host a *Bundle Sunday* or a *Fill A Truck Drive*, your first order of business is to discuss your plans with your pastor, his designated parish administrator or scheduler to obtain permission and support. Once you have permission from the pastor or his designee, make sure that the event is on the Parish calendar and determine where the trucks can be located.

Next, identify a Conference member or group of members who will coordinate the event. This member and/or the group of members will be responsible for promoting the event, for overseeing the truck drop off/pick up and for securing it afterhours as well as for organizing/scheduling workers.

Once those items have been taken care of, call the normal SVdP pickup number (602-254-3338) to schedule a truck to be at your parish on the days/weekend you have selected. Our Call Center and Transportation Manager provided the following outline of what is expected from the sponsoring Conference.

1. Give the Call Center as much notice as possible, with a minimum of two weeks prior to the desired date, to allow the Diocesan staff to schedule the truck drop off and pickup.
2. Know in advance where the truck is to be parked. The truck cannot be moved. We do not leave truck ignition keys, only back-door keys. A secure parking space is required.
3. Collect extra empty boxes and bags to be used to secure small items. Loose items are often lost or broken during transportation and can be responsible for damage to the truck or other donated items.
4. A designated Vincentian will hold the truck's back-door keys and should be sure to lock the truck when it is unattended. The driver will give instructions to the responsible person to leave the keys in a designated spot under the tailgate of the truck at the end of the event.

The Conference is responsible for publicity. Notices in the parish bulletin and neighborhood publications are generally effective. Communication is the key to success. For information on bulletin announcements, contact Vincentian Support Services. Some advertisement pieces are located on the Diocesan web page under VSS.

In addition to being a significant source of merchandise for our thrift stores, *Bundle Sunday* and *Fill A Truck Drives* raise the Conference's profile within a parish and strengthen its ties to parishioners. These local open collection drives are a perfect way for the Society of St. Vincent de Paul to provide others with an opportunity to donate and to serve those in need.

St Elizabeth Seton Conference

Clothing Drive

Our advocate for the poor has had a September drive for shoes and socks for the needy. She has compiled notes on the drive, plus recommendations for a smoother, more productive drive. First, I will tell you the results of the drive which was held on September 9th and 10th of 2023. Advertising was key with bulletin announcement three weeks prior, church screen and verbal announcement two weeks prior, and sign boards out weekend before. Delivery and pick up were cleared with downtown for boxes and flyers were also supplied with detailed information. As stated, athletic shoes and socks were requested for this drive. Shoes were asked to be tied together and if no laces, individually bagged in grocery bags; this worked well. Helpers were asked to save plastic bags and bring them to the pantry. Lots of clothes were received and sent downtown; however, all men's clothing were sent to Santa Teresita. We received 117 pairs of men's shoes, 147 women's, combined socks of 1337, combined underwear of 335 and assorted clothing of 451. Santa Teresita received 60 pairs of shoes, 500 pairs of socks, 100 men's clothing and 200 combined underwear. Downtown received 13 boxes of assorted clothing. We also received \$160, and one gift card.

Twenty boxes were ordered which worked out perfectly. Boxes were labeled by category. Clips held each named category on boxes. The quantity of goods received was recorded on sheets held by clipboards. Quarters were tight in the pantry with all shoes held in one pantry area, overrunning behind the tables, and with socks controlled in another pantry area.

Our advocate has become very efficient, and her drives have been recorded with valuable information for all future drives. If any conferences would like more information on these drives for the needy, please contact our conference as we love to share.

ServWare News

ServWare Financial functions

ServWare includes the ability to define Conference financial accounts which can then be associated with deposit entries, expenditure entries and neighbor assistance entries. Once associated, entry of these transaction types will automatically update the account balance in ServWare. Instant update of the account balance allows Conference members to see the running balance associated with an account, so they are aware of the funds available to help those in need.

In addition to the basic transaction entry in ServWare, some additional features include:

- Recording donations and using mail-merge to generate donor tax letters.
- Generating a period Cash-in/Cash-out report, which can be used for the treasurer's report at meetings.
- Account Reconciliation to the monthly bank statement.
- Calculating the Conference Tithe.

We as a conference are able to record the donor entries, receipts, expenditures, bank reconciliation, home visits, financials, volunteer activity, treasurer reports, district reports and all the way through to the quarterly and annual reports and much more in one program without switching back and forth through files, spreadsheets, etc. As the treasurer, I find ServWare extremely useful.
