Building Bridges

Throughout history, all generations and ages have faced difficulties and challenges and that is certainly true for us. The COVID pandemic, immigration and border issues, questions of racial inequalities and injustices, lock downs, limitations on social gatherings, confusing health data, vaccination requirements and responses, masks, and intermittent shortages of products have created high levels of stress, alienation, unemployment, increased evictions, and the overall polarization of our communities.

Television news and alerts along with the burgage of internet and social media postings are overwhelming and most pander to individuals, groups and situations that highlight extreme positions that promote division and, at times, fuel a lack of tolerance and even hatred for those with opposing viewpoints.

Regardless of where you stand on the current hot bed issues, we must never lose sight of the fact that we are Vincentians. Our personal choices in regards to such things as vaccinations, masking, social gatherings, group meetings and mass attendance must never blind us to our calling to be kind, merciful and compassionate just as the Lord is kind, merciful and compassionate to us.

Vincentians are called to work towards being nonjudgmental and that applies to issues related to our situations. On the news this evening, I saw a clip of parents physically fighting over a discussion concerning mask requirements for students. There was little respect for those on the other side of the issue and almost no sign of self-control. As people of faith, we are called to fight for what is right and just but to fight in a respectful and nonviolent manner.

So how can we avoid being drawn into the extremes of the moment? We do it by remembering who and what we are as Vincentians. Fr. Antonino Orcajo, C.M. Madrid wrote, "It doesn't matter what obstacles come our way, because nothing will be able to separate us from the love of Christ nor from savoring the fruits of his Holy Spirit: joy, patience, kindness and self-control." The love and grace of God combined with a purposeful intentionality on our part to be patient, kind and nonjudgmental with our brothers and sisters provides us with all of the tools we need to be warm and caring.

Each of us has the right and responsibility to make personal choices which help us to be and feel safe and respected but we must conversely respect other individuals and their right to make different choices. As the Society moves forward, let us pray that God will continue to enable us to minister to the poor with the eyes and the heart of Jesus and, if we feel that at this time doing person-to-person ministry is outside of our comfort zone, that we have the wisdom to stay home and support SVdP through prayer and donations.

It is not easy to be a Vincentian in times of crisis and trials but it is precisely the time when we can make the most difference. Over the course of the past eighteen months, many charities have shut their doors, turned off the lights or severely limited their services to the needy, but we have not. We have adapted and protected but we have not changed our mission or commitment to the poor and vulnerable. We can and must continue to be a source of light in the darkness and hope against a backdrop of despair. As Vincentians, may we continue to strive to be the voice of reason and the builders of bridges not of dams.

The 2021 SVdP National Assembly: New Horizons of Hope & Service



The 2021 Society of St. Vincent de Paul National Assembly was a huge success. Ralph Middlecamp, our Nation Council president, summarized the event in a recent article when he wrote, "It was a pleasure to gather in Houston last week with more than 600 Vincentians for the 2021 Assembly of the National Council of the U.S., Society of St. Vincent de Paul. We listened to excellent presentations, participated in wonderful liturgies, socialized with friends old and new, and conducted the National Council's business."

Fr. Dennis Holtschneider's keynote address about the holiness of interruptions was particularly inspiring. His stories brought home how God often uses what appear to be interruptions to call us closer to Himself and to our neighbors. He pointed out that healings are often brought about through interruption, the interruption of human need. He went on to challenge all of us to embrace interruptions and to be willing to be called upon to response to the needs of others.

The Phoenix Diocesan Council was well represented at the Assembly by ten Vincentians, three staff and three spouses that are also associated with the Society. Our Council's staff attendees were Sandy Edwards, Mike McClanahan, and Steve Zabalski. Vincentians in attendance included Jack Ahern, Ed Carpenter, Martha Hernandez, Pete Hernandez, Mary Ann Hunter, Doris Kilroy, Joe Riley, Shirley Smalley, Angel Vogelsang and River Vogelsang. In addition to attending the Assembly, two of our Phoenix Council Vincentians served as presenters in two separate workshops; one on the topic of Collaborations and the other on the issue of Hoarding.

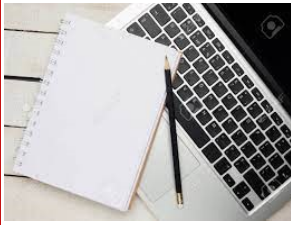

In addition to experiencing the beautiful liturgies, inspirational keynote speakers, and informative workshops, the Phoenix attendees also had time to be together for an unscheduled meal or to just sit in the various lobbies and visit. Being at a National Assembly allows Vincentians to witness firsthand the depth, breadth, and diversity of the Society and to be touched by the unity that ties all of those things and us together.

The 2022 National Assembly will be held in Baltimore, Maryland followed by the 2023 Assembly in St. Louis Missouri and in 2024 the Assembly will be hosted here by our Phoenix Diocesan Council. Here's hoping that in 2022 we can double the number of Vincentians that attend the meeting in Baltimore, triple it for St. Louis and blow our numbers out of the ballpark in 2024.





From the Desk of Conference Resources Committee

Qualified Conferences & Voting Privileges

Attendance at conference meetings is an important part of being a Vincentian and attendance at Council meetings is an important part of being a conference. The District bylaws of the Phoenix Diocesan Council of the Society of St. Vincent de Paul define the criteria for a conference to be considered a “qualified” conference. Those criteria include the requirement that conferences be represented at 80% of their monthly District meetings and 50% of the Diocesan Council’s quarterly General Membership Meetings (GMM) over a twelve month period of time.

Failure to comply with this attendance requirement automatically excludes a conference from voting at the District and/or Diocesan Council levels and can result in further sanctions and loss of access to things such as Diocesan Council Aid, Food Reclamation allotments, Thrift Store vouchers and other services. The calculation for attendance is based not on the SVdP fiscal year but on attendance over the past twelve months, thus giving conferences an opportunity to correct an attendance issue without waiting for a new fiscal year to begin.

Remember that if the president or vice president of your conference is unable to attend a District or Diocesan Council meeting, they may always send a proxy. Attendance does matter and it is the means by which the Society ensures that we have effective lines of communication and how we build fellowship.
